It has been another gruelling year for many of our operators, as if COVID-19 wasn't enough!

The reopening of our borders was a welcome relief not only for our industry but for Aotearoa as a whole. As eager travellers began to book flights to reunite with whānau or start their delayed OE, the opportunity had finally arrived for tourism operators to reconnect with the rest of the world.

Following a strong initial rebound, all eyes were set on our first summer with international manuhiri since 2019. As businesses worked tirelessly to prepare for the influx, heavy rainfall and cyclones turned excitement into despair for many.

It was heartbreaking to see our communities suffer another blow just as they were getting themselves off the canvas. However, it was equally inspiring to watch as operators and communities alike rallied to support each other.

Our calls before, during and in the aftermath of the various weather events demonstrated the kotahitanga within our sector, with numerous operators offering whatever space and time they had to support those in greater need.

Similarly, a heartfelt acknowledgement must be made to operators across the motu who generated inventive solutions to counter the substantial staffing shortages within the industry. It's worth noting that while we celebrate innovation, we also appreciate the timeless value of whanaungatanga — those connections that consistently help us overcome challenges.

I certainly don't apologise if anyone finds this repetitive. As Chair of NZ Māori Tourism (NZMT), I am immensely proud of how thoughtful and considerate our people are, especially at times when one could be excused for only worrying about themselves.

Last year's Tourism Awards marked a historic night for our operators as they clinched an impressive half of the Awards, six in total, kei whea mai! Your outstanding accomplishments underscore the distinctive nature of our experiences and highlight the unwavering dedication to pushing the envelope and establishing fresh benchmarks.

Beyond the Awards themselves, the prevailing theme has been the appreciation of meeting up again, kanohi ki te kanohi. What has resonated the most are the personal stories: new parents, new mokopuna, new homes, the sale of businesses and acquisition of new ones, and even retirement.

The emerging normalcy in the context of our people and our communities is beginning to resemble the comforting familiarity of the 'old' normal, and for that, we are grateful. We have reconnected.

Over the past year, many of you have had the opportunity to meet several of our manuhiri from the Pacific Islands, including those from Samoa, Timor-Leste and Tonga. Our Pacific exchange programme has offered numerous opportunities for cross-cultural and commercial prospects both here in Aotearoa and throughout the Pacific. There's never been a more opportune time to engage and exchange ideas as we see the growth of whānau with Māori and Pacific whakapapa increase.

The whānau at NZMT has had some talented additions, along with the NZMT Board. We welcomed Lee Ann Muntz from Tainui Waka Tourism, an inspiring and tūturu Māori tourism advocate. We also welcomed Hon Peeni Henare as the new Minister of Tourism and Hon Nanaia Mahuta, who gained Māori Tourism as part of her Associate Māori Development delegation. Both Ministers have been strong supporters of our kaupapa.

On behalf of us all, I would like to acknowledge the departure of Jamie Tuuta, Chair of Tourism New Zealand, who has worked tirelessly to be the change we seek. He joined the Board in 2013 and was appointed Chair in 2019. I would also like to acknowledge Kauahi Ngapora of Whale Watch Kaikoura, who has been appointed Deputy Chair of Tourism NZ.

The strength of our sector, coupled with the dedicated efforts of our team, continues to give me confidence in our ability to confront the challenges looming on the horizon as well as grasp the opportunities that will nurture the aspirations of our people and our communities.

This included attending TRENZ, TECNZ Conference, South Pacific Tourism Exchange, Tourism Summit, MEETINGS, Te Ūnga Mai, Business Events Industry Aotearoa Conference and Tourism New Zealand's domestic roadshows.

With many of our operators being immersed in their mahi all year round, it's easy to forget how invigorating whakawhanaungatanga is!









## **World Indigenous Tourism Summit**

In March 2023, a delegation of Māori tourism operators, along with members of our Karakia Tumu Whakawātea whānau, attended the World Indigenous Tourism Summit (WITS) in Perth.

The five-day conference enabled the rōpū to connect with representatives from indigenous communities from across the globe and discuss some of the most significant challenges and opportunities facing indigenous tourism, such as climate change, economic development, authenticity and the protection of cultural intellectual property (IP).





Several members of the delegation spoke at the event:

- Dale Aotea Stephens discussed the work NZMT undertakes to support the Māori tourism sector;
- Lee Ann Muntz (Tainui Waka Tourism) conversed about enabling indigenous people to achieve their aspirations through tourism;
- Hoki-mai Chong participated in a panel discussion on sustainable development of indigenous tourism;
- Nadine Toetoe (Kohutapu Lodge and Tribal Tours) showcased her grassroots approach to empowering her community through tourism;
- John Barrett (Kapiti Island Nature Tours) spoke about Māori cultural practices within a Māori tourism context and how they impact on their drive to care for te taiao. He also took part in a panel about the impact of climate change;
- Lee Timutimu (Arataki Systems)
   revealed his efforts to enrich Māori
   tourism with technology; and
- the rōpū representing Karakaia Tumu Whakawātea (Prof Taiarahia Black, Tei Nohotima and Whitiaua Black) presented their paper on the application of ancient cultural practices.

## **National Recognition**





Māori tourism operators have continued to stamp their mark on the national radar off the back of their exceptional commitment to their mahi, people and place.

Among the biggest calls for celebration were the 2022 New Zealand Tourism Awards Gala Night where Māori tourism operators took out six awards, including the supreme taonga:

- Tourism Industry New Zealand Trust Community Engagement Award & Airbnb Regenerative Tourism Award (Supreme Award) — Kohutapu Lodge and Tribal Tours;
- He Toa Takitini Māori Tourism Award & Marsh Tourism Industry Champion Award — Kapiti Island Nature Tours and John Barrett (accepted by his whānau on his behalf);
- Department of Conservation | Conservation Award — The Landing; and
- NZME Visitor Experience Award Hollyford Wilderness Experience.

Some other moments that underscored the success of our people and culture included the 2023 Hospitality Awards for Excellence. **The Landing** received the Best Luxury Accommodation Award, while **Awa Motel** was honoured with the Best Motel (Under 25 Rooms) Award. In addition, our Chief Executive, **Pania Tyson-Nathan**, along with **Wally Stone** and **Kingi Smiler**, were named laureates for the NZ Business Hall of Fame.

## **International Delegations**

In October 2022, a delegation of NZMT staff and Māori tourism operators travelled to Samoa to build on our joint project — Aho Rua-Va'a Tele.

The visit succeeded in its goals of connecting and building on cultural similarities between Samoan and Māori tourism operators and identifying opportunities to strengthen their experiences and grow capabilities.

We reciprocated the manaaki by playing hosts in March 2023, starting their journey in Kaikōura before making pit stops at various operators in Blenheim, Wellington, Rotorua and Auckland. Following the Samoan delegation's departure, we welcomed a similar rōpū from Timor-Leste in May 2023.











## MBR Tāpoi Programme

The MBR Tāpoi Programme, delivered on NZMT's behalf by Glenn Hawkins & Associates, came to a close in March 2023. The aim of the business support service was to assist Māori tourism operators in transitioning to a new normal from the impact of COVID-19. Advice and support included:

- · hibernation, sale or closure;
- · office support;
- · accounting and financial services;
- compliance (risk, health and safety requirements);
- specialist tourism advice;
- marketing, digital design and communication services;
- business advisory, continuity, forecasting and planning; and
- health and wellbeing.


## Distribution of Māori Tourism Operators by Business Age that Received Tāpoi Funding






## **Service Types Funded**

## **Flood and Cyclone Support**



When Cyclone Hale caused flooding and weather events at the tail end of summer, we quickly turned our attention to collating all relevant information from Civil Defence and Emergency Management centres, MetService and other key agencies to keep operators informed.

When the path and timing of Cyclone Gabrielle became more certain, we began reaching out to operators in the affected regions. This served not only to keep operators fully informed with official announcements but also as an opportunity to check in with whānau about their wellbeing and how they were being affected.

Resources were mobilised and delivered to areas affected by the floods using a variety of means. A helicopter was deployed and road assistance trucks that were departing Wellington were loaded with kai and essential supplies. Small farm planes also played a crucial role in distributing items such as Starlinks, satellite phones and generators.

The value of our operator networks was invaluable as were hapū and iwi organisations who could, and did, help when direct communication with operators or their whānau was challenging. We also owe a debt of gratitude to the many individuals who supported the effort to get supplies packed and distributed to flood affected areas across the motu.

We are organising our first significant Māori tourism gathering since 2019, set to take place in Taupō-nui-a-Tia in 2024.




## Our Strategy
